WILDLIFE IS EVERYWHERE & EVERYWHERE IS WILD!

Hopefully even MORE hens!

Now is a great time to keep an eye on the Moorhens on our 'great' pond on Newnham Green. They arrived back around January 20th; I say arrived back as it is not clear where they have spent the winter! Moorhens on large lakes which don't freeze, form loose flocks and it is possible that our Moorhens migrate a short distance to a large lake nearby, maybe to Fleet or Dogmersfield.

Moorhens are mostly monogamous, forming a pair for life. They eat plants and invertebrates taken while swimming. They do this by dipping their head underwater, up-ending, or while walking on land or on aquatic vegetation. They tend not to dive. They may roost in low trees and bushes at night for protection, when not on the nest.

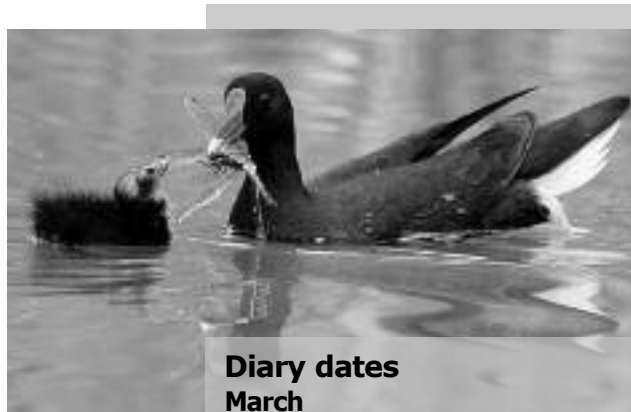
Nesting is territorial, in vegetation on ground near water or floating on water, anchored to vegetation. This

only partly protects them against flooding. The nest is a mass of locally sourced vegetation with a cup lined with grass. They produce five to nine eggs, which all hatch at the same time – and there can be two or three broods in a season. The eggs are incubated by both parents for about three weeks and fledge in 40-50 days. Young from earlier broods often help with nest building, territory protection and incubation.

Mating pairs of Moorhens show bowing, bill dipping, mutual preening displays and chases.

Young Moorhens are occasionally seen being transported by the adults by 'aerial carrying' in times of threat or at dusk. The young may be picked up by the parent's bill, between their legs, or even ride on their back!

Keep a look out in a pond near you.

POLICE UPDATE



Dear Residents,

On Monday February 2nd between 7.30pm and 11.30pm a house was broken into in Blaegrove Lane at Up Nately. I ask if you were in that area between these times and saw or heard anything unusual, suspicious people or cars then please give me a call direct.

We have arrested three people in connection with this crime but seek any information you may be able to provide.

I am also appealing for any information concerning an extremely rare crime of damage to a grave at St Nicholas' Newnham between 2pm and 4.30pm on Tuesday January 20th. Several items on the grave were damaged and thrown around the area. If you saw any vehicles parked at the lynch gate or saw anyone in the churchyard, please do give me a call direct; as always all calls treated in strictest confidence.

Also Newnham seems to be the subject of unwanted attention as during the afternoon of Wednesday February 18th two suspicious men were seen in various parts of the village usually looking at houses, or on farm land at Manor Farm. The men are described as both being white, one late 50s heavy build with dark greying hair, the younger one was mid 20s thin build, moustache with goatie beard short dark hair wearing grey tracksuit bottoms and a blue fleece top and a red shirt.

On Saturday February 14th at 4:45 pm in Up Nately, a blue Volkswagen Golf SE 5-door saloon registration RV13 JYC was seen on a private drive and made off at speed when spotted. A man linked to this car is a convicted thief from Surrey who stole property from an Upton Grey farm in 2013 and was sent to prison. He is an opportunist and will visit homes as well as farms, please be vigilant as he has a good knowledge of all parts of our area, I suspect he has also been seen in Newnham on the 18th.

Also as March approaches may I issue my usual warning to dog owners to please be aware of farm animals. Sheep will soon be lambing and sadly we frequently receive reports of dogs worrying sheep; farmers can lawfully take drastic action if a dog is found sheep worrying on their land.

Many thanks and I hope to provide an update concerning the policing for this area next month along with some more information of last year's crimes in your parish.

MAGNA CARTA CELEBRATIONS ODIHAM 2015

COMMEMORATING MAGNA CARTA AT ODIHAM IN 2015

King John's Castle at Odiham was a stepping stone on the road to Magna Carta in 1215 and plans to commemorate the 800th anniversary are well advanced. The Odiham Society is bringing history alive by rekindling visions of King John riding from Odiham to Windsor and Runnymede on 10th June 1215, where Magna Carta was agreed and sealed a few days later on 15th June 1215. The aim is to include residents, families and schools in Odiham, North Warnborough, Greywell and all the surrounding villages, as Odiham is the focus for Magna Carta Celebrations in Hampshire. Full details may be found at www.odihammagnacarta.com.

Events kick off with Magna Carta Concert at All Saint's Odiham on 16th May with flags being flown throughout Odiham Parish for the following week. We hope other Parishes will join in so that anyone driving through north Hampshire sees colourful flags and pennants flying everywhere. Magna Carta Festival weekend 22nd-25 May begins with a parade and families' festival in Odiham Bury during the Friday evening.

Activity switches to King John's Castle in North Warnborough for Saturday, Sunday and Monday, where a 1215 Village will be created with Feudals Living History demonstrating and living the trades and life of eight centuries ago. There will be arena displays of falconry, King John meeting Barons, martial skills and battle re-enactment, plus static displays, food and refreshment stalls, and 'Time Team' archaeology digging all weekend in the search for evidence of 1215 community and the roadway from the Castle to the Royal Deer Park. There will also be a Flower Festival, Embroidery Exhibition, Magna Carta Exhibition, Art Trail, Ale Trail, Canal Boat Rally and Morris Festival (circa 200 dancers).

Displays for schools will be rotating around north Hampshire shortly and these can come to village halls, or churches or other venues if desired. **Everything is run and enacted by volunteers and anyone who wishes to help out or join is very welcome to sign up at getinvolved@odihammagnacarta.com.**

ODIHAM & OLD BASING HEALTH CENTRES

PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP – FEBRUARY 2015

In December 2014 there were 220 missed appointments in total at the Odiham and Old Basing Surgeries. This is equivalent one doctor for a week! If you are unable to keep your appointment please let the Surgery know – even if it is on the day – they can often fit someone else in at short notice.

The Surgery is now able to send you a text confirming the details of the appointment at the time it is made and a reminder on the day before you are due to attend. Please give your mobile phone number to the receptionist when you make the appointment if you would like to make use of this facility. You can also ask to receive a text message when test results are received in the Surgery.

Routine appointments can be booked and repeat prescriptions ordered on line. Your personal password to access the system can be obtained by calling at your Surgery with photo identification.

You may have heard in the news recently that waiting times in many A&E departments across the country are increasing, and that patients not utilising alternative services available to them is contributing to this wait. So when you have a health issue where should you go and who should you call?

A lot of illnesses can be treated at home with medicine you can buy at your local pharmacy and by getting plenty of rest. 'Selfcare' is the best choice to treat very minor illnesses and injuries.

When you need medical help and advice, but it's not a 999 emergency, you can call 111. NHS 111 is a fast and easy way to get the right help, whatever the time. Calls to 111 are free even from mobiles 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

For less urgent health needs, you should still contact the surgery or local pharmacist. Our Surgeries offer 'extended hours' on some days – opening early in the morning or late into the evening, so try the practice first. Don't forget, pharmacists don't just dispense prescriptions, they can also provide advice and over the counter medicines for a whole range of problems.

For life threatening conditions such as choking, chest pain, blood loss or blacking out, do not hesitate to call 999.

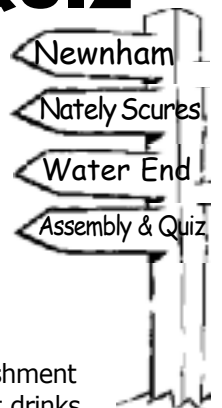

LOCAL PLAN – THE FUTURE OF OUR VILLAGES

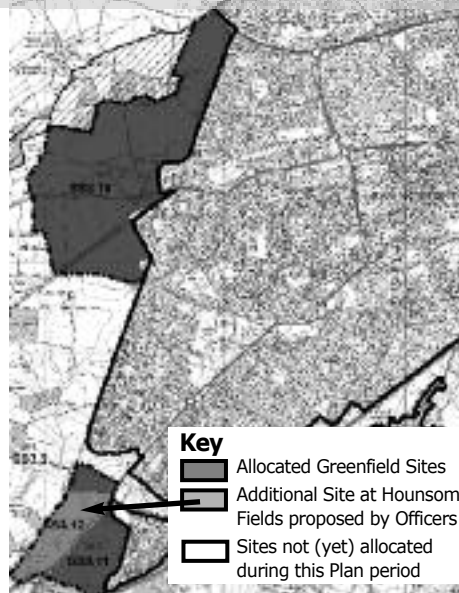
Following the Inspector's recommendation for an increased housing figure of 850 dpa (dwellings per annum) BDBC Cabinet agreed in January that 850 be used as the basis for further work. This will equate to a total of 15,300 new dwellings – including approx 7,690 on Greenfield sites – over the 18-year Plan period 2011 to 2029.

In particular, BDBC now has to find sites for the extra 1,800 dwellings over and above the Council's original recommendation. Further green fields around Basingstoke have been considered – once again including sites to the north and east of Old Basing.

The *Villager* will unfortunately go to press before the Economic Planning and Housing Committee meetings of 4th (and 12th) March, where updated proposals will be reviewed.

It can be seen that, in response to a direct request from BDBC to double the housing quota for SS3.9 (Land East of Basingstoke) to 900 units, landowner Hampshire County Council has stated categorically that its decision to limit SS3.9 to 450 within this Plan period stands and is not up for negotiation – with considerable thanks to County Cllr Elaine Still. This is also good news for



the adjacent larger sites nearer to Newnham which, though at this stage still vulnerable, would be further opened to potential development by increased housing on SS3.9.

Officers have put forward Hounsomes Fields SS3.12 as the new Greenfield site (750 units) – SE of Basingstoke adjacent to the Golf Course and Kennel Farm sites – plus three new brownfield sites totalling 150 units. The remaining shortfall appears to be taken from 'contingency' built into the previous figures. If agreed, the revised recommendations will be subject to public consultation in May/June this year.

The map shows the current allocation of Greenfield sites for this Plan period and the potential for housing allocation this side Basingstoke – to date largely averted thanks to the efforts of Ward Councillors Onnalee Cubitt and Sven Godesen, SOLVE members, Country Watch, and MP Maria Miller.

However, make no mistake, this is a still a critical time for the future quality of life in and around the Loddon Valley and our Parishes. Details of how you can donate to SOLVE can be found on the website www.solveloddon.org/.

Basingstoke is not alone. Despite opposition from Local Groups, Councillors and MPs, Planning Inspectors across the country continue to frustrate elected Councils with their blind insistence on more houses. In our case, like many others, they seem to ignore infrastructure, environment, transport, and many other factors.

The question must be asked – what is the best way to address the need for housing in the UK? Endless housebuilding is not the answer. Other factors are infrastructure, environment, transport, population and quality of life.

Dear Friends

Roland and I have just spent a couple of nights in Southampton and during our time there we walked the length of Southampton Water along the shore, from picturesque Hamble with its ancient priory church and yachting marina, passing the oil refinery at Fawley on the opposite side of the Water, the Royal Victoria Military Hospital at Netley, lots of wading birds by the water's edge, the tower blocks at Weston and then over the big bridge across the River Itchen and back to the city centre. It was not a pretty walk – but it was very interesting and varied – and we thoroughly enjoyed the things we saw.

I grew up within the sound of the ships' hooters on the River Thames not far from Tilbury Docks – another area that is interesting rather than pretty!! That meant I was very used to seeing little tug boats on the water, ready to escort the larger boats into the dock. But I don't recall seeing them in action as we did on our walk. We'd seen a massive container ship coming along the Solent by Cowes, making its turn into Southampton Water. As it came close we could see that it was heavily laden with containers and towered over everything around it. Then we saw two little tugs sailing downstream towards it, side by side at first, but then separating so they seemed to be one either side of the ship. One tug then slowed to a halt and turned itself around, preparing to take the lead; the other continued to the back of the ship and then turned around to bring up the rear. And in stately procession, the tiny little tugs dwarfed by the big vessel, they made their way to the container dock, where they disappeared from our view, but where they would have towed, nudged and prodded the big boat into position by the dock.

It is hard to imagine how those little boats can have the strength to control something so enormous but they are surprisingly powerful and very manoeuvrable which gives them a real advantage over the bigger ships.

And without wanting to push an analogy too far, I sometimes feel like a little tugboat, surrounded by a whole armada of great big ships: major issues that I need to have a view on, life-changing events that are besetting people all around me, the pressure to do something about the decline in churchgoing, the concern as to what sort of world we are leaving for those who come after us... the list goes on and on. And the only way I can prevent myself from being totally overwhelmed by all these things is by keeping in touch with God and praying for the power of his Holy Spirit to be at work in me. And then, small as I am in the face of all life's problems, I am surprised to find that people listen to what I say, are comforted by my presence, and with a nudge and a prod I can begin to make a difference.

Little boats, little people – with the right power at work in them – can have a surprising influence on the world around them!
